ABOUT **USC KAUFMAN**



Founded in 2012 by a transformational gift from visionary founder Glorya Kaufman, the University of Southern California created its sixth art school and, at that time, its first new school in nearly 40 years. The USC Glorya Kaufman School of Dance expands upon USC's unique signature as a world-class research institution with a deep commitment to the arts. With its enterprising vision for arts education, USC Kaufman is at the forefront of developing

dancers, choreographers and dance leaders for the future.

The exciting opportunity to create a new school brought the chance to rethink the professional degree for the 21st century and the role of a dance school within the greater national ecology. To fulfill this monumental intention, USC Kaufman envisioned a new model of dance education, called "The New Movement"—a hybrid and collaborative approach expressed in studio practice, music, choreography, performance, new media and scholarship, where artistic preeminence is combined with thoughtful industry access.

By encouraging interdisciplinary and collaborative work, USC Kaufman seeks to transform dance. It embraces the artistic rigor of conservatory dance instruction with unparalleled academic opportunity offered by one of the world's leading universities to shape the next generation of dance leaders who are connected to the world-at-large.

The program encourages students to think across boundaries and take advantage of the diverse cultures both on campus and within the Los Angeles arts community. Students approach the study of dance with a global perspective, reinforced through collaboration with national and international artists.

In addition to bringing together a stellar list of faculty and Artists in Residence, the program features the repertory of several iconic and innovative choreographers including Founding Director Jodie Gates, as well as George Balanchine, Jiří Kylián, Ohad Naharin, Crystal Pite, Dwight Rhoden, Sonya Tayeh and Rauf "RubberLegz" Yasit, among other significant dance-makers.

Graduates of the BFA program have gone on to secure contracts with Broadway productions and dance companies including Alonzo King LINES Ballet, Ballet BC, BalletMet, Ballet Hispánico, BODYTRAFFIC, Complexions Contemporary Ballet, Hubbard Street Dance Chicago, Oregon Ballet Theatre, RUBBERBAND, and The Joffrey Ballet, among others. They have also gone on to pursue careers in choreography, arts administration, marketing and business.

Meet the Choreographers



KYLE ABRAHAM

USC Kaufman Claude and Alfred Mann Endowed Professor in Dance Choreographer: 5 Minute Dance (You Drivin'?)

Kyle Abraham (Artistic Director, A.I.M by Kyle Abraham) and his choreography have been featured in *Document Journal*, *Ebony*, *Kinfolk*, *O Magazine*, *Vogue*, and *Vogue UK*, amongst other publications. Abraham is the proud recipient of a Dance Magazine Award (2022), Princess Grace

Statue Award (2018), Doris Duke Award (2016), and MacArthur Fellowship (2013). He currently serves as the Claude and Alfred Mann Endowed Professor in Dance at The University of Southern California (USC) Glorya Kaufman School of Dance (2021-). Abraham also sits on the advisory board for Dance Magazine and Hubbard Street Dance Chicago. He is a member of the American Academy of the Arts and Sciences, the inaugural Black Genius Brain Trust, and the inaugural cohort of the Dorchester Industries Experimental Design Lab, a partnership between the Prada Group, Theaster Gates Studio, Dorchester Industries, and Rebuild Foundation. Rebecca Bengal of Vogue wrote, "What Abraham brings ... is an avant-garde aesthetic, an original and politically-minded downtown sensibility that doesn't distinguish between genres but freely draws on a vocabulary that is as much Merce [Cunningham] and Martha [Graham] as it is Eadweard Muybridge and Michael Jackson." His company, A.I.M by Kyle Abraham, is widely considered "one of the the most consistently excellent troupes working today" (The New York Times). Led by Abraham's innovative vision, the work of A.I.M is galvanized by Black culture and history and grounded in a conglomeration of unique perspectives; described as a "post-modern gumbo" of movement exploration. The company's recent works include An Untitled Love (2021), a thumping mixtape celebrating culture, family and community; Requiem: Fire in the Air and Earth (2021), a reimagining of Mozart's Requiem in D minor through abstracted themes of afterlife, reincarnation, mythology and folklore; and A.I.M's Emmy-nominated film If We Were α Love Song (2021), a series of poetic vignettes set to the music of Nina Simone. Abraham has been commissioned by a wide variety of dance companies including Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater, Hubbard Street Dance Chicago, The National Ballet of Cuba, New York City Ballet, and The Royal Ballet. Highlights include Abraham's collaborations with NYCB—When We Fell (2021), reviewed by The New York Times as "among the most beautiful dance films of the pandemic" and The Runaway (2018), recognized on the "Best Dance of 2018" list by The New York Times. Abraham was the final choreographer commissioned by Paul Taylor before his passing, creating Only The Lonely (2019) for Paul Taylor American Modern Dance. In addition to his work for A.I.M and other major dance companies, Abraham has choreographed for many of the leading dancers of our time including Misty Copeland, Calvin Royal III, and Wendy Whelan. Meet the Choreographers



TYCE DIORIO
Artist in Residence
Choreographer: Balkan Beat Box

Tyce Diorio's greatest passion in life is telling stories through dance. His enthusiasm and love of the art form have led him to choreograph award-winning works for television, film, and stage. As one of the most recognizable choreographers on Fox Television's hit show *So You Think You*

Can Dance, where he was also a guest judge for six seasons, Diorio has become known as one of the most versatile in the industry. As the innovator behind Taylor Swift's Red, 1989, and Reputation albums, live performances, and world tours, Diorio has become one of the most sought-after choreographers in Hollywood, counting the Shake it Off and Look What You Made Me Do music videos as some of his most popular works. Diorio's knowledge of dance history and ability to take the audience on a journey has become part of his signature style, earning him the respect of his peers and a highly coveted Emmy® Award. He continues to evolve in the mediums of television, concert stage, commercials, and film, staying on top of the changing market and making his mark as a trendsetter. His ability to navigate between different genres such as Lorde's Greenlight and The Weeknd's Can't Feel My Face videos to television shows like Grey's Anatomy and Drop Dead Diva, to films like the soon-to-be-released seguel to the High Strung dance film, speak to his creativity. He has rounded out his career by choreographing national commercials for Nike, I Can't Believe It's Not Butter, Gillette, and many more, and TV Shows that include Drop Deαd Diva, Carrie Underwood's Christmas Special, Bones, Grey's Anatomy, American Idol, and Dancing with the Stars with the incomparable Annie Lennox and Jewel. Diorio has a unique talent to cultivate affinity with the actors he works with and has had great success in coaching and choreographing for celebrities such as Cameron Diaz, Megan Mullally, Katie Holmes, Christina Applegate, Tom Cruise, Queen Latifah, Tobey Maguire, and Laverne Cox. His experience as a professional dancer, working with some of music's most iconic artists including Janet Jackson, Jennifer Lopez, Ricky Martin, Mya, *NSYNC, Paula Abdul, Kelly Osbourne, and Toni Braxton has given him a deep knowledge base to build from. Broadway was Diorio's first love, and as a teenager and avid enthusiast, it is likely that he has seen every show ever produced, sometimes seeing his favorites up to ten times. He himself has graced the Broadway stage in the Tony Award-winning shows Chicago and Fosse, and he continues to bring his proficiency and deep affection to every live show he gives life to. Diorio was honored to choreograph the Hudson's Theatre's Sweet Smell Of Success, a tribute to Marvin Hamlisch, starring Lindsey Mendez and Jeremy Jordan. He also did work on Music City, a modern country musical directed by Mary Kate Burke, which opened at the Cape Fear Theatre in the Fall of 2018. The best things about Diorio are not his unparalleled work ethic or his unquestionable passion for dance, but rather his keen sense of humor and ability not to take himself too seriously. His work speaks for itself. Those who know, respect, and love Diorio will sing his praises any day.

Meet the Choreographers



THOMAS FORD
USC Kaufman Assistant Professor of Practice
Choreographer: In Its Wake

Thomas Ford, MFA, is an interdisciplinary contemporary dance artist and scholar. His research examines the mechanisms of identity and culture through an exploration of embodiment, choreography, and Black, queer, critical, and performance studies. Since 2016, he has collaborated with

artistic partner—and husband—Steven Atwater. Using original sound scores, technology spanning mediated forms, and emergent movement vocabularies inspired by historically ostracized bodies and sci-fi folklore, they build worlds, where the social, political and cultural entangle with the aesthetics of their collective histories. Ford's choreographic work has appeared at the Joyce Theater, Symphony Space, Ailey Citigroup Theater and the Kaye Playhouse, and been presented at Next@Graham, the Peridance APEX Showcase, the Capezio A.C.E. Awards, the STEPS Performance Lab and the Joffrey Ballet School's winter and summer concerts. His writing has appeared in ELLE, Dance Magazine, Movement Research Performance Journal, the Brooklyn Rail, Dance Spirit—where he served as a contributing editor—Dance Teacher, the Dance Enthusiast, and CultureBot. His writing is part of a forthcoming anthology, edited by Sherrie Barr and Karen Schupp, that will be published in 2024. His performance credits include The Kennedy Center Honors, The Today Show (NBC), Debbie Allen's Dreams, A Capitol Fourth (PBS), The Radio One Music Awards and performances with the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra. He has toured with Mike Minery's Tapaholics and the renowned D.C.-based troupe, Tappers With Attitude. He has performed Darvejon Jones' Afro-contemporary work at the Kraine Theater and La Mama Experimental Theatre Club in NYC. Ford has taught at the Joffrey Ballet School (NY), Marymount Manhattan College and Hunter College/CUNY, and serves on the editorial board of the Journal of Dance Education (JoDE). The National Foundation for Advancement in the Arts (NFAA/YoungArts) recognized him as a Presidential Scholar. Ford holds a BA from Marymount Manhattan College and a MFA in dance from Hunter College/CUNY.



D. SABELA GRIMES
USC Kaufman Associate Professor of Practice
Choreographer: Round/Now

d. Sabela grimes is a trans-media storyteller, sonic ARKivist, movement composer. Improvisational systems and collaboration are at the heart of his creative practice, inhaling through socio-historical observation, self-examination and speculative meanderings, exhaling through layers of

interconnected sonic, visual, and kinesthetic arrangements. Sabela be investing in the poetics of assemblage, the magic of mutability, mastering misuse. Past projects include *Philly XP*, *World War WhatEver*, *40 Acres & A Microchip*, and *ELECTROGYNOUS*. Sabela's current collaborative endeavor with Meena Murugesan, Parable of Portals, dreams Butler's professional and personal writings into live performances, audio-visual installations, site-specific short films, and interactive community activations. Each experience realizes quantum Blackness as a means to play within the nowness of recurring futures. On faculty at USC's Glorya Kaufman School of Dance, he continues to cultivate Funkamental MediKinetics, a movement system that draws on the layered dance training, community building, and spiritual practices evident in Black vernacular and Hip Hop/Street dance forms. He is a 2023 USC Associates Award for Artistic Expression recipient, 2021 Bessie Award winner for Outstanding Performer, 2017 County of Los Angeles Performing Arts Fellow, and 2014 United States Artists Rockefeller Fellow.

Meet the Choreographers



JIŘÍ KYLIÁN Choreographer: Forgotten Land

The world-renowned choreographer Jiří Kylián (Czechoslovakia, 1947) was artistic director of Nederlands Dans Theater for nearly a quarter century. He started his dance career at the age of nine, at the School of the National Ballet in Prague. In 1962 he was accepted as a student at the Prague Conservatory. He left Prague when he received a scholarship for

the Royal Ballet School in London in 1967. After this, he left to join the Stuttgart Ballett led by John Cranko, Kylián made his debut as a choreographer here with Paradox for the Noverre Gesellschaft. After having created three ballets for NDT (Viewers, Stoolgame and La Cathédrale Engloutie), Kylián became the company's artistic director in 1975 together with Hans Knill. In 1978 he put Nederlands Dans Theater on the international map with Sinfoniettα. That same year, together with Carel Birnie, he founded NDT 2, which served as a bridge between school and professional company life and was meant to give young dancers the opportunity to develop their skills and talents and to function as a breeding ground for young talent. In 1991 he initiated NDT 3; a company that created opportunities for older dancers, above 40 years of age. This three dimensional structure was unique in the world of dance. After an extraordinary record of service, Kylián handed over the artistic leadership in 1999, but remained the company's house choreographer until December 2009. Since his last piece Mémoires d'Oubliettes for NDT in 2009, Kylián's creative focus has shifted to more small scale projects and films. Kylián's entire body of work counts 100 creations to date, of which 77 performed by NDT and no less than 75 were especially created for the company. Furthermore, he made pieces for companies worldwide such as the Stuttgart Ballet, the Opéra de Paris, the Munich Bayerisches Staatsballett, and the Tokyo Ballet. In 2020, NDT 1 presented the program Sometimes, I wonder, which marked the return of Kylián's work. Kylián received many prestigious, international awards and honours, such as Officer of the Royal Dutch Order of Orange-Nassau, Honorary Medal of Order for Arts and Science of the House of Orange given to him by Her Majesty Queen Beatrix, honorary doctorate of the Juilliard School in New York and the Honorary Medal from the President of the Czech Republic. In March 2019, Kylián was inaugurated as a member of the Académie des Beaux Arts in Paris. This highly prestigious recognition was complimented with the Academy's decision to change its statutes and add a special seat for "dance." To this day, Kylián's masterpieces are frequently performed by numerous dance companies and schools around the world.

Meet the Choreographers



JASON RODGERS
USC Kaufman Lecturer
Choreographer: Timeless heartBeats

Jason Rodgers is a tap dance educator, dancer, choreographer, actor and musician. His dance journey began at age seven as a pupil of Paul Kennedy & Arlene Kennedy at Universal Dance Design in Los Angeles, California. His credits include The Academy Awards, the North American tour of the

Broadway musical *Bring In Da Noise*, *Bring In Da Funk*, *Dancing With The Stars* (ABC), *So You Think You Can Dance?* (FOX), and *Station 19* (ABC). Rodgers has also choreographed and performed tap dance for Disney, Verizon, Dodge, Gatorade, Microsoft, Cosmopolitan Hotel & Casino in Las Vegas, and the Closing Ceremony of the European Games in Baku, Azerbaijan. He has had the privilege of working with Debbie Allen, Tim Robbins, Jerry Lewis, Donald O'Connor, Fayard Nicholas, Eddie Brown, Michael Peters, George C. Wolfe, and Mandy Moore. Jason Rodgers Entertainment is his Los Angeles-based company that creates live interactive shows involving song, dance, and tap history. His dance work throughout North America, Europe, Asia, Australia, South America, and Africa has included Madison Square Garden, The New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival, The Paris Jazz Roots Festival, and the world-renowned Stockholm Tap Festival in Sweden. Rodgers is currently the Director of Dance for Oasis Center International—a nonprofit organization that provides art programs for children in Orange County and Los Angeles schools. Rodgers is looking forward to sharing his love, knowledge, and experience as a tap teacher with the USC Glorya Kaufman School of Dance.



SPENSER THEBERGE Artist in Residence Choreographer: For Time

Spenser Theberge is a multi-hyphenate performer and creator, working across the fields of choreography, dance, movement direction, text, costume design, pedagogy, and installation work. He is a graduate of The Juilliard School and a former company member with the Nederlands

Dans Theater I & II, and The Forsythe Company, as well as a guest artist with Kidd Pivot, the Goteborgs Operans Danskompani, the ARIAS Company, RGWW, and with choreographer Astrid Boons. Theberge's creations are multi-disciplinary and genre-defying, continuously exploring the intersection between process and performance. His work has been commissioned and presented by Hubbard Street Dance Chicago, The Juilliard School, GroundWorks DanceTheater, Modus Operandi, LA Dance Project, The Broad Museum, MOCA Geffen, REDCAT, The Korzo Theater, Gothenburg Opera Dance Company, Place des Arts, and the Queer Biennial III in LA. Theberge's collaborations with partner Jermaine Spivey have been additionally supported by Hollins University, PACT Zollverein, Nuova Officina della Danza, and presented by The Korzo Theater, The Frankfurt LAB, Place des Arts, Oregon Contemporary, Reed College, and NAVEL. As a movement director and performer, Theberge has worked with artists, brands, and organizations such as Taylor Swift, Gwen Stefani, LANY, UGG, Rami Malek, Ryan Pfluger, the Tune-yards, Seaworthy Jewelry, and the New York Times Magazine. He has also designed costumes for Andrea Miller, the ARIAS Company, and performing artist Frances Chiaverini, and is the text writer behind Alexander Ekman's award winning Cacti and Hubbub, as well as Astrid Boons' Do you believe me yet?. Theberge is a former dance faculty at California Institute of the Arts, an Artist in Residence at The Juilliard School and USC's Glorya Kaufman School of Dance, as well as at conservatories, schools, and programs across America, Europe, and Asia. Theberge is a YoungArts award winner, a Presidential Scholar in the Arts, and a Princess Grace Award winner.

Caili Quan is a New York-based choreographer who danced with BalletX from 2013 to 2020. She has created works for BalletX, The Juilliard School, Vail Dance Festival, American Repertory Ballet, Sacramento Ballet, Stars of American Ballet, Asbury Park Dance Festival, School of

American Ballet, Flight Path Dance Project, Oakland Ballet, Columbia Ballet Collaborative, and Ballet Academy East. She served as an Artistic Partnership Initiative Fellow and a Toulmin Creator at The Center for Ballet and the Arts at NYU. With BalletX she performed new works by Matthew Neenan, Nicolo Fonte, Gabrielle Lamb, Penny Saunders, Trey McIntyre, and danced at Jacob's Pillow Dance Festival, Belgrade Dance Festival, and DEMO by Damian Woetzel at the Kennedy Center. Mahålang, a short documentary that wove familial conversations of her Chamorro Filipino upbringing on Guam with scenes from BalletX's Love Letter, was shown at the Hawai'i International Film Festival, CAAMFest, and the Dance on Camera Festival at Lincoln Center. She also participated in New York Choreographic Institute's 2022 Fall Session under the direction of Adrian Danchig-Waring. Quan was a 2022 Artist-in-Residence at the Vail Dance Festival and is a Creative Associate at The Juilliard School.

Fiona Lummis Eddy was a dancer for 20 years with Netherlands Dance Theater (1981-2001). Fiona created roles in 15 of Jiří Kylián's ballets, and in numerous works by Hans Van Manen, Nacho Duato, Ohad Naharin, and Mats Ek, among others. She danced featured roles in the repertoire of

William Forsythe, Jerome Robbins, Lar Lubovitch and Glen Tetley. She graduated from the Elmhurst School of Dance and The Rambert School in England, and also has a comprehensive Pilates teaching certificate from B.A.S.I. (Body Arts and Science International). In 1992 she received the Gouden Theaterdans Prijs for her performances in William Forsythe's *Steptext* and in 2000 was awarded the "Oeuvre Prize" in recognition of her career in The Netherlands. Fiona can be seen on many of the Arthaus films of Kylián's ballets, including the *Black and White Ballets* and *Kaguyahime*. She is also featured in eight recordings of Hans Van Manen's ballets in his *Master of Movement* DVD collection, and is recognized as one of his Muses. Fiona works closely with the Kylián and Van Manen foundations, teaching their repertoire in colleges, schools, and companies in the US and Europe.

Holley Farmer, MFA, University of Washington, was a member of The Merce Cunningham Dance Company from 1997-2009, receiving the New York Dance and Performance Bessie Award for Sustained Achievement. Her performances with MCDC include a repertory of over

50 dances, and 13 original roles created for her by Cunningham, with multiple seasons at Lincoln Center, Kennedy Center, Brooklyn Academy of Music, Paris Opera, Théâtre de la Ville, the Barbican, and venues in 23 countries. With Twyla Tharp, she danced on Broadway originating the principal role of Babe in *Come Fly Away*, for which she received an Astaire Award Nomination. In 2011, she began staging the work of Cunningham, and creating her own choreographies. Her solo work has appeared at New York Live Arts, the Museum of Arts and Design, LaMama, the Joyce Theater, and Jacob's Pillow. For the last 12 years, in higher education, she has taught theory and practice courses, and has served on the faculty at Mills College, Hunter College, Sarah Lawrence College, Nassau Community College, CSU Long Beach, and CalArts, among national guest teaching and lecture engagements including Stanford University, and Southern California Institute of Architecture. Her early career was inspired by training with Hae Shik Kim, leading to positions in Theatre Ballet of Canada, *Phantom of the Opera* (785 performances), and Oakland Ballet.
